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



- Do not rush into choosing a particular option. If you are unable to find the answer; use the rule of elimination to reach the most appropriate answer. Usually ruling out other 3 options works out faster.

FAQs

1. Can we use black pen in CBSE board exam 2021?

As per last year's CBSE guideline, students appearing for CBSE Board Exams can write answers ONLY with a Blue color pen (blue or royal blue). It should be a ball point, gel or fountain pen.

If the students want to use a black pen to highlight or bold the points in answers or for writing titles or headlines then it is allowed.

2. When will CBSE provide datesheet for 2021 boards?

Exact dates for all subjects' exams is usually provided in the month of December of the ongoing academic session. Last year it came on 16th December 2019. Expect the same in the month of December and expect the exams start date to be later than March for the 2020-21 session.

3. How do I access latest CBSE circulars and announcements?

You can always email us on quickreply@agpgroup.in for any update you want. As far as official source is concerned, refer: www.cbseacademic.nic.in/circulars.html.

4. What is the process of applying for a recheck of Marks in a particular subject?

Any student has the right to do so within a week from date of declaration of CBSE board exam result.

The whole process of verification of marks is done online. Steps to apply for verification/rechecking of the answer sheet, are as follows: Apply for rechecking of marks on the CBSE's website www.cbse.nic.in by filling in your details and paying Rs. 500 per subject online (only). The result of verification of marks will be uploaded on the website automatically.

Overall, the verification will be restricted to checking whether all the answers have been checked, there has been no mistake in totalling of marks for each question and the marks have been transferred correctly on the title page of the answer book. A candidate may also apply for obtaining a copy of the evaluated answer book(s) at a later stage if not satisfied with the evaluation

5. Who should I reach out to for any issue related to examination, reevaluation of copy or any serious matter?

Ideally your only point of contact should be your school and they will take action on your behalf by submitting a request to CBSE regional office. However, we have managed to source some useful contacts in CBSE. Please refer to the next page for more information.

SOLUTIONS

WITH CBSE MARKING SCHEME

Note: The text in all grey boxes are solutions given in the CBSE Marking Scheme 2020-2021.

PART - A READING

1. (i) (b) make the process sound simple

Explanation: Father's question challenged the narrator so his remark cannot be considered as criticism. Therefore (a) cannot be the answer. His question did not encourage the narrator to take up the cooking nor did he want to showcase his culinary skills (as given in c & d options). His remark made the process sound so simple that the narrator took up to learning to cook rice. Hence, (b) is the correct answer..

(ii) (a) He switched on the radio to listen to the news while having dinner.

Explanation: In the passage, 'switched' is used to mean a shift in interest or choice. Options b, c, and d all show the same meaning. Hence, (a) is the answer as here "switched" means to turn on.

(iii) (c) 4,1,5,3,2

Explanation: As given in the passage, first we need to put the rice in a utensil (point 4). Therefore, options b and d are not correct. Rice is washed in the second step (point 1). Hence, option a is also ruled out. Therefore, option c is the correct answer.

(iv) (b) clumsu

Explanation: One who is dextrous is good with his/her hands. If the author had not been dexterous he would have been clumsy, which refers to someone who is awkward in handling things.

(v) (a) Image 1

Explanation: (a) The narrator tells us that there should be equal amounts of rice and water. This is shown in image 1. Hence, option a is the correct answer.

(vi) (c) She enquired about it.

Explanation: The narrator's mother, on smelling the odour of burnt rice, came towards the kitchen shouting. Hence, option a, commenting on it and option b, brushed aside are ruled out. The narrator managed to ward her off so there was no question of her handling it. Hence, option d is also not the answer. She just shouted to ask what had happened in the kitchen. Hence, option c is the correct answer.

(vii) (c) presumptuous

Explanation: The narrator was conscientious (aware of one's duties). She was not at all courteous as she didn't ask anyone for help. We can definitely say she was presumptuous as she took the risk of experimenting during his very first attempt at cooking.

(viii) (b) The speaker may not have much of a stage presence, but you've got to admit she's got chutzpah.

Explanation: Chutzpah means self confidence. A court of law cannot dispense self-confidence to anyone so (a) is not the answer. Expertise in something is not chutzpah, so (c) is not the correct

answer. No one can take over someone's confidence to help them emotionally/financially, so (d) is incorrect. Option (b) is the correct answer because it shows the self-confidence of the speaker.

(ix) (d) Smelling the delicious aroma of cooked rice

Explanation: When the narrator checked on the rice, he turned off the stove option (a). He was shocked to see the rice sticking to the bottom of the pan (option b). As he found that some of the rice was stuck, he scraped them off (option c). As the rice was a little burnt, he couldn't smell the aroma of the cooked rice, so (d) is the answer.

(x) (a) almost perfect to taste

Explanation: The narrator's creation, as he tells us, had a little less salt so (c) cannot be the answer. The narrator was happy with the result, so (b) also can't be the answer. In para 4 the narrator tells us that the rice wasn't bad, at all hence, (d) cannot be the answer either. Here (a) is the answer as the narrator tells us that the rice had the desired consistency.

(xi) (c) 3 and 6

Explanation: The narrator was happy with his work so there was no question of frustration (point 1). The process was in no way entertaining or amusing for the narrator (point 2). The process was not in any way disillusioning as whatever belief he had about cooking of rice was proven right (point 4). The narrator found the process to be very simple, hence it wasn't exacting either (point 5). The narrator was happy and found the experience satisfying (point 3). It also taught gave him a new sense of respect for those who cook food (enlightenment, point 6). Hence (c) is the answer.

2. (i) (d) easy availability of the Internet

Explanation: Though the present generation is techno-efficient (a), this can in no way replace traditional education. The expanse of courses on technology (b) have brought technological advancement but have not changed the education system. Simplification of learning and teaching methods (c) has made the learning process easier but the real revolution came with the availability of the Internet (d) which has brought information within the reach of almost everyone.

(ii) (c) 2 & 3

Explanation: Point 1 is true as given in para 2. Point 2 is not true as the author has not given any citations to support this. As the author says that the students use the Internet to do their assignments and projects, point 3 is also not true. Point 4 is true as we can see from the survey data. Hence (c) is the correct answer.

(iii) (d) "incredible"

Explanation: Tremendous means very huge and in para 3 it refers to the vast source of information that is available on the Internet. This source of information is not expensive (a). Though the Internet is renowned (b), but tremendous does not have the same meaning as renowned and is not used in this sense here. Neither is 'tremendous used in the sense of being innovative (c) either. The Internet is indeed an incredible (unbelievable) (d) source of information and this is the meaning here.

(iv) (c) Option (3)

Explanation: According to the survey graph, less people use the Internet for leisure as compared to the number of people who use it for work. The pie graph area of work will be more than that of leisure, hence (c) is the correct answer.

(v) (b) plagiarism

Explanation: Plagiarism means to present someone else's work as one's own creation. In the passage, the given line is used in context of the research done by students, so here it is used to mean option b, plagiarism.

(vi) (b) 2 and 4

Explanation: Everyday usage of computers for personal use is more than that of email so 1 is



not true. Statement 2 is true. Statement 3 is not true as more people use email 2—3 times a week than those using it once a month. Statement 4 is true. Hence (b) is the answer.

(vii) (a) Never using the internet for work and leisure

Explanation: As per the survey graph, all the respondents use the Internet for work, leisure, or both. Hence, (a) is the correct answer.

(viii) (a) indignant

Explanation: As we can see, the student has been given an "F" grade by the teacher, apparently on the grounds that his facts are wrong. He is now arguing with the teacher. This shows he is neither apologetic nor obedient (options b and c). He is not inquisitive enough (d) to cross-check his facts. He is rather annoyed (indignant). So, (a) is the answer.

(ix) (c) More than 50% stated enjoying both versions of books for leisure reading.

Explanation: The survey was conducted to understand the e-book usage experience so (d) is true. (a) is true as 74% of the respondents preferred printed books for leisure reading. (b) is also true as 45% preferred using e-books for research or assignments. Hence, (c) is the correct answer.

(x) (b) Option (2)

Explanation: According to the respondents, page number citation is a favourite at 75% and content transfer preference is 43%, so (b) is the correct answer.

(xi) (a) 1, 3, 4, 2

Explanation: According to the survey

Point 1 is preferred by 57% of the respondents.

Point 2 is the preference of 75% of the respondents.

Point 3 has 60% preference.

Point 4 is preferred by 67% of the respondents.

So, the order will be 1,3,4,2. Hence, (a) is the answer.

LITERATURE

3. (A) (i) (d) temporary

Explanation: Transit means to carry things from one place to another. Here "transit homes" mean dwellings that are temporary.

(ii) (a) hyperbole

Explanation: A simile is used to compare a thing with another thing of a different kinds to make it's description more vivid. A synecdoche is a figure of speech in which a part represents whole. A personification is when a non-living thing is compared to a person's nature or given a human characteristic. So, options b, c, and d are incorrect. A hyperbole is an exaggerated statement, hence, this is the answer.

(iii) (b) necessity

Explanation: Immorality, means wickedness which is not connected to survival or food. Option c, obligation is to which a person is morally bound. Food requirement is not an obligation, Option d, ambition is a strong desire to achieve something. Food is not an ambition, for survival. Food is a necessity for survival hence, (b) is the answer.

(iv) (c) Rag picking has attained the position of a skill.

Explanation: Fine art is something that requires some sort of skills. Here rag picking has been compared to fine art, that is, it is a skill. So (c) is the correct answer.

(B) (i) (c) the crowd was listening only to Gandhi.

Explanation: As the paragraph states, Gandhiji helped officials control the crowd hence c) is the correct answer.

(ii) (b) dread instilled in the hearts of Indians had begun to lessen



Explanation: The paragraph states that the demonstrations were proof that the might of the Britishers challenged. Hence, option b is the correct answer.

(iii) (c) sarcastic

Explanation: The statement doesn't produce humour, hence (a) is hence not the answer. There is no sudden or striking event in the statement hence b) is also not the answer. The statement is not persuading anyone so, (d) is not the answer either. The statement presents an irony, hence it is a sarcastic statement, option (c).

(iv) (b) calm acceptance

Explanation: Gandhiji was concerned about the happenings of the country. He was moved by the sequence of events going on in the country. So a, c, and d are ruled out. He calmly accepted the events, hence (b) is the answer.

(C) (i) (a) curious and irritable

Explanation: Jo looked out of the window at the crack of day and showed she was curious. As we are told John didn't like women to take things for granted. This shows he was easily annoyed, so we can say they were curious and irritable, as given in option (a).

(ii) (b) getting restless

Explanation: Fuss displays excessive excitement. When someone becomes restless they tend to fuss with their hands. Thus getting restless, option (b) is the answer.

(iii) (b) 2 and 4

Explanation: When someone is terrified (point 1) he/she will not be able to speak the complete word. Ignorance (point 3) is shown by a quickly spoken word and joy (point 5) is shown with an exclamation. Something said in the form of a question doesn't show approval (point 6). Speaking in such a manner gives an impression that the person is startled or not pleased with the events. Hence, here it shows surprise (point 2) and/or displeasure (point 4). So, (b) is the answer here.

(iv) (d) shock, anger and disapproval.

Explanation: This statement shows that the mother was annoyed with the smell. Neither did she approve of it, nor was she pleased. She was rather shocked and angry. Hence, (d) is the answer.

4. (A) (i) (b) badly maintained walls.

Explanation: Sour gives an impression of something that is unpleasant. Artifacts, display and wall-to-wall furniture are not unpleasant to the eye. Therefore (a) and (c) cannot be the answers. Here, as this line has been written to refer to a slum school, it shows that the walls have not been maintained properly. So, (b) is the correct answer.

(ii) (a) hopes and aspirations of the children.

Explanation: School authorities of a slum school seldom plan a trip for their students so (b) is ruled out. Children of slums have a poor knowledge of the outside world so that also is not the meaning here. The world here refers to the hopes and aspirations that these children have in their hearts, when they come to the school for education. Hence, here the answer is (a).

(iii) (d) an irony

Explanation: This expression cannot be a pun as it does not involve any humour (a). It isn't a satirical remark as it does not involve any political or individual issues, (b). This expression doesn't copy anyone to produce humour, so it is not a parody either (c). In this passage, decoration of the walls of a classroom is described. The decoration is in contrast with the actual atmosphere of the school and its pupils. Hence it expresses an irony (d).

(iv) (c) life ahead for the slum children is as unclear and hazy as fog.

The answer is (c) as it talks about the future of the children. It tells the reader that just as the way ahead on a foggy day is unclear, the same is the case with the future of the slum children.

Explanation: This poem is about nature's blessing to we humans. Immortal drink here refers to the nature's teachings that we get when we hear or read the stories of our mighty forefathers. So (c) is the answer here.

First at a beach when he was engulfed under a large wave and was knocked breathless. His father merely laughed without realizing the impact of the experience on the psyche of a five-year-old. This goes to show how other people cannot understand our battles. In life, the person who is undergoing the trauma knows the pain, while others might just brush it off as something trivial.

Dougla's fear was further aggravated when he nearly drowned in the YMCA pool. The fear of water took control of his life. Douglas decided to overcome that fear and worked hard with his instructor. He challenged his fear and finally succeeded in overcoming it. Similarly, life throws many challenges at us, but we must try and face the challenges bravely and defeat them.

The ironmaster realizes his mistake and wants to turn him out but Edla reminds him of Christmas being a time for sharing and helping. Her kindness brings about a change in the peddler and he gives up his old ways and decides to lead a reformed life. This goes on to show that human interaction and companionship is more important than isolation.

The skunk's mother knows that without proper protection he might fall prey to the predators, which brings out the stereotyping of individuals on the basis of appearances. The wizard makes the mistake of fulfulling wishes without weighing the consequences.

The story highlights the need to be open-minded and also more accepting of change.



- destination within 11 minutes during peak hour traffic. That organ saved a nine-yearold girl whose life depended on the transplant.
- (4) Similarly, such green corridors have been created by traffic police of various cities such as Pune, Mumbai, Delhi NCR, etc. Personnel are stationed at selected points to divert, control and clear the traffic giving way to the ambulance. Apart from this, a motorcade of police vehicles accompanies the ambulance ensuring that it does not face any problems. Delhi Traffic Police provided a green corridor from IGI Airport to Institute of Liver and Biliary Sciences in Vasant Kunj for transportation of a liver. The distance of 14 kms was covered in 11 minutes.
- (5) Experts point out the lack of a robust system to transport organs to super-speciality hospitals in least possible time. National Organ & Tissue Transplant Organisation (NOTTO), the country's apex organ donation agency, is now framing a proposal to airlift cadaver organs and will send a report to the Union Health Ministry. "Cadaver organs have a short life and so transplant should be done within a few golden hours." Director (NOTTO) expressed, "Therefore, we are preparing a proposal for airlifting organs at any given moment."

Of course, it provides us with a pleasant way to relax and spend our free time, but in some countries people watch television for an average of six hours or more a day. Many children stare at the TV screen for more hours a day than they spend on anything else, including studying and sleeping. Its clear that TV has a powerful influence on their lives and that its influence is often negative.
- (3) Recent studies show that after only thirty seconds of television viewing, a person's brain 'relaxes' the same way that it does just before the person falls asleep. Another effect of television on the human brain is that it seems to cause poor concentration. Children who view a lot of television can often concentrate on a subject for only fifteen to twenty minutes. They can pay attention only for trie amount of time between commercials.
- (4) Another disadvantage is that television often causes people to become dissatisfied with their own lives. Real life does not seem so exciting to these people. To many people, television become more, real than reality and their own lives seem boring. Also many people get upset or depressed when they can't solve problems in real life as quickly as television actors seem to.
- (5) Before a child is fourteen years old, he or she views eleven thousand murders on the TV. He or she begins to believe that there is nothing strange about fights, killings and other kinds of violence. Many studies show that people become more violent after viewing certain programmes. They may even do the things that they see in a violent show.
